Grammar Test – Subject and Object Pronouns

We will be testing again NWEA this week. This is will be our final round of NWEA testing for the year. The goal is for all students to show growth from the fall testing on all three tests (Language Arts, Reading and Math). Please make sure students are doing all they can to come to school ready to work hard and succeed. I have no doubt our class will do great!

Late work

It is hard to believe that the school year is already half complete! By this point in the school year, I expect students to have our classroom routine down fairly well. This includes turning things in on time. Due to this, late work will no longer be eligible to receive full credit. Some students struggle to get assignments turned in on time regularly. Assignments that are expected to be turned in are written in red on our back agenda board and they are always due to the same location. I make it very clear whether an assignment is to be turned in or kept at their seat to check together. If a student is absent, they will be given the appropriate amount of time (based on how many days or the amount of work that was missed) to make up any late work. This could potentially hurt student's grades if they have a habit of turning assignments in late.
